# Towards a Greener Future

Like many businesses Ascott Village Shop is continually looking for ways to evolve and adapt to ensure it remains relevant and useful to the community it serves. This means trying new products and approaches, some of which may not work, others will hopefully prove popular and become a "standard" offering in the shop. One such experiment which seems to be working is the introduction of a range of refillable products.

When back in March a refillable products proposal was put to the committee there were concerns as to whether customers would be prepared to bring in their own containers, and also whether we'd actually sell more produce or just move existing sales to the refillable lines. But the decision was taken to invest a small amount of money in some dispensers and to see how it went on a fairly limited range of goods.

The good news is it has been a success. We've not just replaced sales of existing pre-packaged items but have sold a greater quantity of the items stocked and feedback has been positive, often suggesting additional items we should stock.

So based on this success we've expanded our range and are now selling:

- More varieties of rice, including white, brown and risotto
- Jumbo and standard porridge oats
- Luxury muesli
- Bread flour (strong white and Cotswold Crunch)
- Ecover washing up liquid
- Ecover detergent and fabric softener
- Ecoleaf general purpose surface cleaner
- Ecoleaf hand cleaner
- Faith in Nature shampoo and conditioner (various scents)
- Faith in Nature body wash (various scents)

All this is housed in our new refillables area (with some rather smart gravity dispensers) just inside the door of the shop. So come along, bring your containers (though we do have some for sale if needed), and take a small step to helping reduce climate change whilst also saving some money.

The committee would like to take this opportunity to thank Harriet O'Brien for the original idea, Sandra Staples for developing the proposal and managing the trial and expansion, Jonathan Wells for assisting with the build and posters, Geoffry Taylor for some vital metal cutting and Bridgette Crundwell for sourcing the products.



# Ascott Village Shop

Having now entered into 2023 and with another year behind us, we thought it appropriate to provide you, our valued customers, with an update on what is happening in our Village Shop - Heart of the Community.

The year 2022 saw us turning a corner in that the shop was again back to being profitable. However, this profit comes with a small caveat in that it has been entirely driven by sales to the many trades people / builders who have been working in the village over the past 12 months. With several building projects soon to be completed we expect this incremental ales, and hence profit, to slide away. We are also not expecting the government's energy support to continue beyond March and hence eating further into our cash reserves. We are therefore even more than ever reliant upon our villagers supporting the shop. We appreciate that these are difficult times, yet we have many loyal customers, to whom we are thankful, but we would love for more of you to pop into the shop and support our continued existence.

Talking about difficult times, at the shop we have over the last many years been collecting products for the North Oxfordshire Community Foodbank. We are very pleased, as is the Foodbank, with the significant increase in the in-shop purchased donations we have received over the past four months. All the products purchased in the shop, and donated to the Foodbank, go straight back into the North and West Oxfordshire communities, with several families in the Wychwoods receiving a fortnightly food parcel. Thank you!

We have been busy increasing our presence on social media. Those of you who are following the shop on Facebook will have noticed that we are now keeping you informed on new products as well as seasonal products in the shop. We also post meal ideas, should you have run out of ideas yourself or just need a last minute meal then pop in to the shop and we are confident you will find something to tie you over that evening. If you are on Facebook and do not already follow us, please do look us up and click Follow.

In January two new members joined the committee. Jon Wells and Sandra Staples have joined myself, Bridgette Crundwell, Jacquie Bugeja, Stuart Fox and Merv Bates on the committee, and have come on board to help us identify and drive forward new projects. After seven plus years of hard work managing the weekday rota and ensuring the shop has been consistently staffed on weekdays, Gaynor Taylor has stepped down from her role as rota manager as has Nicky Coldstream, Gaynor's deputy over the last couple of years. We thank them both for their support and hard work over the years. We have been unable to find a new 'Gaynor' but we have found a new Deputy. The management of both the weekday and weekend rotas has been moved across to a new platform, the app(tly) named Deputy. We hope the app will stand up to the challenge of managing our volunteers' shifts.

On the subject of volunteers, we are still in great need of more volunteers. As of my writing this update, we have two permanent vacancies in the shop: Monday Midday Shift and the first Saturday of each month. If you would like your shop to continue to serve the community and can spare a few hours each week, please pop into the shop and leave your contact details with one of our volunteers.

Since the last edition of the Grapevine there have been a few changes to the trustees with Nick Carter standing down as a Trustee after many years of dedicated service to the hall and I along with the rest of the committee thank him for his efforts over the last few years. John Bugeja has taken over as chairmen from Simon Gidman who still remains a committee member (there's life in the old dog yet). Ingrid Ridley has also stepped down as the booking clerk but also remains on the committee. New members Howard Morris & Mark Pidgeon are now trustees with Howard taking over the treasurer role and Mark is now the Booking Clerk & Marketing Manager (who thought that one up?).

The hall has been steadily losing money each month due the massive rise in its running costs so unfortunately from the 1st January the hire rates have had to increase (not greatly, just enough to keep the hall afloat).

To help us with the costs of installing these we are going to be holding some fund raising events over the course of this year and probably next. Wychwood Folk Club's patron Chris Leslie of Fairport Convention is going to play in July with all funds going to the hall (he's a very nice man) so if you've never been to a folk club event why not try this one (you may enjoy it) and you'll be contributing to keeping the hall afloat. Local Rock Gods 'Three Piece Sweet' will also be holding a fund-raising event in June which will include a BBQ, raffle etc so another event to look out for.

Also look out for future 'Flix in the Stix' among many other activities the hall is used for. If you fancy a go at Martial Arts then they have lessons every Monday evening, The Post Office is still there on Friday Afternoons. If you're new to the village and you have young children then we have an excellent pre-school situated right here in the hall Weddings, birthday parties, dances, fitness etc the hall can be used for all these and more. We have full fibre broadband and can also offer PA hire.

# **Cotswold Line Promotion Group (CLPG)**

The Cotswold Line Promotion Group (CLPG) is delighted to announce that its first charter train since 2019 will take passengers from stations along the line to Taunton, Exeter and Torbay.

A nine-car Great Western Railway (GWR) InterCity Express Train (IET) will make the trip to the South West on Saturday, April 22, starting from Oxford and heading to Worcester, before running to Somerset and Devon.

On the return journey, the train will be routed from Taunton to Oxford and will then drop off passengers at stations towards Worcester.

Members of the CLPG, which represents passengers on the line, were given priority to book reserved seats on the train, but non-members are now welcome to make bookings as well.

CLPG chairman John Ellis said: "We know how much our members and people living along the line enjoy being able to catch a direct train to a special destination. We are looking forward to seeing friends old and new. I would like to thank GWR for making an IET available for the day."

While final timings are subject to confirmation, the train is due to leave Oxford at 06.00, the picking up passengers at Hanborough, Charlbury, Kingham, Moreton-in-Marsh, Honeybourne, Evesham, Pershore, Worcestershire Parkway and Worcester Shrub Hill, where it will depart at 07.36, then call to drop off passengers at Taunton and Exeter St David's. It is due to reach Paignton at 10.41.

The return journey will leave Paignton at 15.54, calling to pick up passengers at Exeter St David's and Taunton, before reaching Oxford at 18.53 and then stopping at Cotswold Line stations before terminating at Worcester Shrub Hill at 20.22.

Standard class tickets are £55 for adults (£45 for CLPG members) and £30 for children aged 5 to 16 (£25 for members' children). Children aged under five can travel free of charge. All first class tickets have been sold. Payment can be made by cheque or using online banking.

# Ascott Martyrs 150 June 2023

This year sees the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 'Chipping Norton Incident' that made 'martyrs' of 16 women from Ascott sent to prison for supporting agricultural workers in the village who were striking for a living wage. Today these women and their story is commemorated by the chestnut tree on the village green planted to mark the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Their names are displayed and their story told, on the seats that surround it.

Although not expunged from the history books, the story of the Martyrs is rarely referred to or widely known. After decades of research Beverley McCombs, a New Zealander whose Pratley ancestors hailed from Ascott, published her book *The Ascott Martyrs* in 2016. Copies of the book are available from the village shop. This helped to stir renewed interest in the story which was then taken up and promoted by the Ascott Martyrs Educational Trust, formed in 2018 and tasked with making the story known to a wider audience.

To mark the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 'Chipping Norton Incident', the Trust is planning a variety of activities. Exhibitions in local libraries, and a programme of talks will bring the story to the attention of people across Oxfordshire. Ascott will be the

focus for events taking place over the weekends that fall either side of the  $20^{\text{th}}$  June, the date in 1873 on which the village celebrated the safe return of the Martyrs and two babies from Oxford Gaol, and saw each of the women presented with £5 (the equivalent of several months' wages) collected by the Agricultural Labourer's Union by public subscription.

A full programme is available on the Trust's website, but high-lights will include a family/local history afternoon (with tea, cake, conversation and lots of pictures) in Tiddy Hall on Saturday, 17<sup>th</sup> June; a words and music event with Three Acres and a Cow, with contributions by local musicians, on the evening of Saturday 24<sup>th</sup>

June. A cricket match on Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> June will see the Martyrs pitted against the Establishment(!), together with teas and trails for those who would like to explore the Martyrs' story and the village, or learn more about the contemporary hanging in the Church that celebrates the Martyrs and the community in which they lived.

To discover more of the Martyrs' story and about life in Ascott in 1873, follow us on Facebook where regular posts will introduce you to the many aspects of this amazing story and the people who played a key part in it. Check out the website *ascottmartyrs.co.uk* to learn more about the Martyrs and follow their story as it gradually unfolds via our blog.

To mark the anniversary former Chair of the Trust, Paul Jackson, is publishing a collection of essays by academics and local historians, under the title '*The Ascott Martyrs* – *Why did the rural establishment imprison 16 women and two babies in 1873?*'. The book explores aspects of the Chipping Norton Incident in the wider context of later 19<sup>th</sup> century politics and society. The close relationship between the new Agricultural Labourers Union and the Nonconformist Church is highlighted and the impact of emigration explored. The book also draws heavily upon the extensive local and national newspaper coverage the event received and the discussions it provoked in the House of Commons. Copies of the book are available on Amazon from 8 March or from Jaffe & Neale in Chipping Norton at £14.99. Proceeds will go towards maintaining the memory of the Martyrs and their story.

A belated 'happy' new year to everyone who contributes to this great community of ours here in Ascott. Of course, 'happiness' is something people have sought since time began through wealth, power, success, travel, love & passion, security adventure, beauty – indeed every aspect of life. However, all that energy and experience has proved there are no easy answers, no magic formulas.

Here in Ascott, happiness is relative. Through no fault of their own, we will know friends and neighbours who are experiencing difficulties. Sometimes a kind word does the trick, sometimes something more substantial and practical is needed.

With the cold snaps we all experienced in December and January, a warm home & hot, nourishing food are an essential part of the survival basics as we wait for spring to kick in.

Many of us will be fortunate to have back-up cash reserves to pay for the unexpected. However, that doesn't apply to everyone. This is where the Village Charity, can make a difference.

We started our Cost of Living appeal in September when we heard that heating bills were expected to double. Together with the unexpected rapid rise of food prices, it meant several people here in Ascott were going to struggle. # Local Elections on 4 May

# West Oxfordshire District residents will need photo ID to vote.

For the first time, residents in West Oxfordshire District will need to show photographic ID to vote in person at this year's local elections which are being held on 4 May.

Residents are being urged to make sure they are ready to vote in May by checking they have an accepted form of ID.

Accepted forms of ID include a UK, European Economic Area (EEA) or Commonwealth passport; a UK, EEA or Commonwealth drivers' licence; and some concessionary travel passes, such as an older person's bus pass. Voters will be able to use expired ID if they are still recognisable from the photo and the name on the ID should be the same name as appears on the Electoral Register.

Anyone who does not have one of the accepted forms of ID will be able to apply for free ID online at <u>https://www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate</u> or by completing a paper form which is available from the Council.

More information is available on the West Oxfordshire District Council website, including details of how to apply for the free ID. Anyone not able to visit the Council website, or apply for a Voter Authority Certificate online, is being encouraged to contact the Council as soon as possible and no later than the 5pm deadline on Wednesday 25 April.

#### Giles Hughes, Returning Officer for West Oxfordshire District Council, said:

"Anyone voting at a polling station in England this May will need to show photo Identification to staff before they can be given their ballot paper(s). It's important that everyone understands what types of ID they can use, and how to apply for free ID if they need it.

"With elections taking place in various areas in West Oxfordshire on 4 May 2023, it is important that those who want to vote make sure they are registered to vote and have an accepted form of ID. It may seem early but checking now means you will be ready to vote in May.

"Residents who do not have one of the accepted forms of ID can apply for free ID either online or by completing a paper application form which is available at our Woodgreen office or by calling us at 01993 861410. If you need any help with applying for the free ID, or want to request an application form, contact our electoral services team on 01993 861410."

Anyone who wants to have their say in the elections this May must also be registered to vote. If you aren't already registered it only takes five minutes to register online at <u>www.gov.uk/register-to-vote</u>. Voters wishing to apply to their council for free ID should first make sure they are registered to vote.

The requirement to show photo ID at the polling station, is a new requirement, introduced by the UK Government's Elections Act which was passed last year and comes into effect for the first time this May.

The changes do not affect postal votes but do affect proxy voters who will be required to show their own valid ID when voting on behalf of someone else.







# Nature Note

Did you take part in RSPB's annual Big Garden Bird Watch? Were you pleased with the number of birds seen and the range of different species present? If not, what can you do to encourage more birds to visit your garden and help them sur-



vive the winter, when food is scarce and weather conditions are harsh? Why not consider setting-up a feeding station? Birds have a number of basic requirements. They need food, water, protection from predators and possibly somewhere nearby to roost and nest. All of these needs can be catered for in an average garden. For your feeder station to be as effective as possible, it is important to choose appropriate foods, present them in the right way and make sure that your visitors are well protected. You might also consider putting up a nest box or two and if you have the space consider cul-

tivating trees that will provide autumn berries and nesting opportunities.

In its natural habitat each bird occupies a niche in the food chain, based on the type of food it eats and where it feeds. Collard Doves and Chaffinches normally feed on the ground scavenging seeds that have fallen. Greenfinches, Goldfinches, and Bullfinches harvest seeds from Docks and Thistles and also from catkins. The natural food of Tits, Warblers, Wrens, Treecreepers and Woodpeckers are insects and Spiders whereas Blackbirds and Thrushes are fruit eaters, although they also take worms, slugs and insects. Some birds, like Starlings, will eat almost anything and like Wood Pigeons can become a nuisance chasing off smaller birds and taking all the food. Birds will be attracted to feeding stations because they offer food in concentrated doses and require little expenditure of energy. Birds will often take food which is not part of their natural diet, for example Tits feeding on peanuts. To attract a many species you need to supply a range of food and offer a variety of feeding areas.

A wide variety of foods are available including wild bird food mixtures, although these often contain Wheat and Barley grains, which are only suitable for ground feeders such as

Pigeons and Pheasants. They may also be bulked-up with split peas, beans, dried rice and lentils, which are not suitable for smaller birds. If possible, it's best to buy individual varieties of seeds etc. Here are a few suggestions for suitable foods:



**Black Sunflower seeds or Sunflower hearts-** Highly nutritious, an excellent all year-round food and will attract a wide variety of birds.

**Niger (Nyjer) seeds**-These small black seeds will attract Goldfinches, Greenfinches, Sparrows and Nuthatches.

**Peanuts-** The most used food. Crushed or grated nuts attract Robins, Dunnocks and even Wrens. Whole peanuts in hanging mesh bags will be visited by many birds, especially Blue & Great Tits. A word of warning, never put out loose whole peanuts during spring or summer as these pose a choking hazard if fed to chicks.

**Coconuts**-Feed fresh coconut only, by hanging-up half shells. Never feed desiccated coconut and keep an eye on the shells removing them if they show any sign of black mildew.

**Fat Balls**- Are excellent winter food. They can be purchased ready-made or you can make your own with melted fat (suet or lard) mixed with seeds, nuts, died fruit and cheese. The melted fat can fill suitable containers, such as empty coconut shell and left in the fridge to set. Don't use fat balls in the summer as the warm weather can quickly turn the fat rancid.

Live Food-The most widely available live food is Mealworms which will be enjoyed by a wide variety of birds, but especially Robins, Blue Tits, Pied Wagtails and other insect-eating birds. They are usually used dry, but can be soaked in warm water making it easier for young birds to digest. Specialist suppliers may also sell ant pupae and waxworms plus insectivorous food mixes.

Just as you might choose a range of different foods in order to attract a wide range of bird species, so too you need to offer a variety of bird feeders. A simple tray will serve to attract ground feeders and a bird table will be widely used by many different species. It is useful if the bird table has a canopy to keep the food dry. Tube feeders are ideal to contain fine

seed and will be well used by many Finches and Tits. Suet and fat balls can be contained in ready-made feeders or mesh bags or simply



hung from a line or tree. Whole Peanuts can be contained in nylon mesh bags hung from a tree and will attract Tits and even Woodpeckers and Jays. Whatever feeders you use hygiene is vitally important. All feeders should be cleaned regularly and stale food discarded. Because you are potentially attracting a large number of birds to a small area any disease will be easily and quickly spread. Also, stale food may cause salmonella infections.

Make sure that there is always a supply of clean, fresh water nearby.

Remember, during the winter months birds visiting your feeding station will become dependent on you and once you have started feeding you should continue and not suddenly stop!

#### Pests and problems

Keep the feeding area clear of discarded food as this may encourage unwanted vermin. Squirrels can be troublesome so it may be necessary to use feeders that contain anti-squirrel arrangements, but

you will find it difficult keeping squirrels off of bird tables. A concentration of birds may well attract a Kestrel or a Sparrow Hawk. Whilst it may be distressing to see a small bird snatched remember that bird of prey has to get its meal somewhere, that's nature in action. Finally, cats will be attracted to your feeding area, but apart from keeping a watchful eye you have to rely on the birds disbursing when a cat is about.



Two diseases have had a major effect on songbirds. Trichomoniasis (Canker) has severely reduced populations of Greenfinches and Chaffinches and other song-birds. Avian Flu, once a winter problem brought to our shores by migrating birds is now endemic and all birds, large and small, can succumb. It's no longer just a problem for poultry farmers and breeders of our Christmas Turkeys.

I hope that I haven't put you off feeding the

local birds. It doesn't have to be too complicated, one tube feeder filled with suitable seeds will be a life saver during the winter months and offer you the prospect of seeing many bird species that would otherwise go unnoticed.

Diverse, personal collection of WW2 art to go on display at Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum, Woodstock

- The Art of World War II: A Personal Collection will go on show from 25 February to 7 May 2023
- Featuring original artwork produced during, and depicting, the Second World War
- A diverse range of styles and subjects, from well known and lesser-known artists
- Exhibition to tour following first show at SOFO Museum

An exhibition of diverse, original artwork, all produced during, and depicting scenes from the Second World War, will go on display at the Soldiers of Oxford-

shire Museum, Woodstock, from 25th February to 7th May 2023.

The exhibition first went on display at the museum in March 2020, but was open for less than a week before national lockdowns were put in place in response to the COVID-19 pandemic - meaning many will now get the opportunity to see these historic pieces for the first time.

*The Art of World War II* exhibition has been curated from John Noott's personal collection of artwork, gathered together during his career as an art collector and dealer for over 40 years. Drawn together, the art forms a history in pictures of the Second World War while showcasing incredibly personal perspectives which reflect a varied range of experiences before, during, and after the conflict. Through the work of artists of the time, visitors will see the war unfold 'as it happened'.

Visitors to the exhibition will be able to see a view of Dunkirk as troops are evacuated, painted by a nephew of Winston Churchill, John Spencer Churchill, a reflection of what he had witnessed during his own army service. The artist would return to England to inform his uncle personally of the need for boats to assist in rescuing the troops there.

Elsewhere, the plight of both evacuees and refugees is seen as artists of the time depict the many people displaced by war, such as those coming to Britain as part of the *Kindertransport* rescue programme in the build up to the Second World War.

The artists whose work is included in the collection range from skilled amateurs to professionals, from those already renowned at the time to those who would go

on to make a name for themselves in a post-war world. A sketch by Eduardo Paolozzi, better known as a pioneering pop-artist, contrasts newly arrived American troops with a typical Oxford scene of a student cycling through the city with the famous skyline as a backdrop. The artist faced discrimination and later internment under the Enemy Aliens Act, along with many of his family, when they moved to Britain from Italy.

The exhibition also features art from *Vogue* fashion illustrators forced to flee Paris, and Beano cartoonists that turned their hand to cartography to aid General Montgomery in North Africa.

Collector John Noott also knows how wide-reaching the impact of the war was on a personal level, having grown up in wartime Britain. He was seven years old in 1939, and remembers clearly many nights in air raid shelters and his father's service with the Local Defence Volunteers after work (later to become the Home Guard, or 'Dad's Army'). These lived experiences inspired him to gather the collection throughout his own career. Following this first exhibition since the pandemic, John will make the collection available to hire for exhibition at museums and venues around the country as we approach the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of WW2.

The Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum is open from Tuesday-Saturday 11am-5pm and Sunday 2pm-5pm. The county's own military history museum is located in the gardens of the Oxfordshire Museum, Park Street, Woodstock, on the doorstep of Blenheim palace.

# **FUN ON THE FARM** GUNFIGHT AT HONEYDALE CORRAL

Once upon a time, not so long ago, I was happily cultivating a field at Honeydale Farm. The work was doing well that evening when a scud of fine drizzle came across; then I suddenly stopped the tractor and gazed in amazement. Some distance away through the drizzle and the dust stuck on the side window of the tractor cab, I could see a very strange animal trotting down the field. I thought it didn't look quite like a bear more like a wild boar. Perhaps it had escaped from a local zoo. Perhaps someone would come looking for it. I was partly right. About ten minutes later a man came across the field. I knew him, it was Gordon Smith. 'Hey Jim,' he said "Have you seen a wild boar?"

Unbeknown to us he was fattening some wild boar in the disused pig pens across the main road where the poultry sheds now are. One had escaped through the doorway while he was feeding them. We looked round the buildings but saw no sign of him. "Put some cattle cake in a shed," he said. "Then shut him in when he is eating it and we shall be able to catch him." So I tried that. Did no good. Well I never thought it would.

In a day or two the boar became adopted by our eighteen young cattle. They stayed in the field grazing through the daytime, then I called them in for a bucketful of cake in the evening and they stayed in at night. The wild boar stayed with them. I don't know how much grass he grazed but he certainly ate his share of cattle cake. We called him The Lodger. He didn't seem to grow much but that was not our problem.

A couple of months later and it was into autumn, the grass was less nutritious so I had the big cattle in for two bales of hay and a bucket of cake in the mornings. They had it in a round feeder in another yard. The Lodger soon sniffed it out and he was also soon jumping up into the middle of the round feeder having first go at the cake, before the cattle could get to it. In a week or two he had decided that he was king of that castle, he became greedy and belligerent. I didn't begrudge him a bit of cake but when he started snapping at the noses of the cattle to stop them having their share that was a pig with a different snout altogether. Their soft noses were no match for his rapidly growing tusks. "We shall have to have something done." I told Smithy. To give Smithy his due he was no slouch when it came to delivering a plan of action. He would get the Chippy Vets to come down and he would get the use of a pie van to transport the Lodger back over the road. This would be nothing new for the vets. They routinely treated the wild animals at the Wild Life Park.

The designated day came. Steve Cannon the vet arrived with a rifle and dart." I need to use the right amount of anaesthetic in the charge." he said "How much

does he weigh?" "About fifty kilos," I told him "but put plenty in." Then Smithy arrived with the pie van and we were ready for action to commence.

I spread a bucket of cake along the manger, Steve Cannon crouched down behind the manger in a sniper's position, then I gave the cattle a shout, "Come on you litt'luns," and rattled the cake bucket and they all came charging in including the Lodger. The Lodger immediately smelt a rat or a vet to be precise. The gun banged, the Lodger took off round the yard at a rate of knots; the dart bounced off his shoulder and flew over the wall of the yard. The Lodger then did a wobble. "I've got him," shouted Steve. Our cries of dismay, "Oh dear, what a pity," and more meaningful exclamations, changed to joy. Oh good, hooray and such like. The Lodger tottered on and then keeled over in the only large mucky puddle in the yard. Steve led the way with a sack to carry him on but his foot got stuck, he overbalanced and he also went down in the mucky puddle. To his eternal credit the language stayed clean. The cattle by now had finished their cake and were eager to escape before it was their turn, so I opened the gate and let them out.

Things were pretty straightforward after that. The Lodger was soon loaded up. Smithy drove off with the Lodger in the van. Steve followed on with the antidote vaccine to bring him round again and we were back to normal.

A week or so later Smithy brought us a very nice joint of wild boar meat. We feasted like kings. It was delicious. So all ended well but I did just wonder how thoroughly that pie van was cleaned after the event. We shall never know!

# Parish Council News Spring 2023

January has been a busy time for everyone as we look to the year ahead and your Parish Council is no exception. We have forthcoming Coronation of King Charles III, the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Ascott Martyrs organized by AMET, and of course the many regular and irregular duties in the village.

### Planning

As every resident should now be aware, the year has begun with the prospect of a new development of 41 houses on the Crown Farm land behind the Green, Church View and Heritage Lane. In addition to being the largest single development in the history of the village, this if granted would open the doorway to further developing the land to the West behind Maple Way and Dawls Close, and to the South all the way to the Charlbury Road.

Judging from the responses we have received to date the village shares in our concerns over the suitability and scale of such a development and its likely impact on our fragile infrastructure. The trigger for this is reportedly the current suspension of the West Oxfordshire Local Plan, following a challenge made in Burford over the available land supply.

The Local Plan affords the village a level of protection against unsustainable development, but even when that is not in effect there are still strong arguments that can be made on the basis of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and the fact that the village lies within the Cotswolds AONB. These are, however, somewhat uncharted waters and it does makes matters considerably more complicated when setting out our case.

As I write we are expecting a statement from WODC to clarify where this stands, and for the developers to submit their application, which in turn will determine how we respond, but one thing is for sure: this will be taking up a lot of the time and effort of the PC over the coming weeks and months.

Looking at the current development, Kingerlee have promised to make good the damage done to the verges in London Lane caused by vehicles having to navigate around their parked vans. We expect them to honour that.

Planning and development are not, however, the only thing that will be occupying us.

# Coronation

We are looking into various options for marking the Coronation. Details have yet to be thrashed out, but we expect to hold an event at the playing fields during the Bank Holiday weekend where, amongst other things, we will be distributing coronation mugs to the young people in the village.

More details will be posted as they emerge, and we remain open to sensible suggestions. As always, please keep an eye on the village noticeboards and posters in the village shop.

Cost of Living

Last year we thought about hosting a Cost of Living event following a similar model to those run by Chipping Norton Town Council. At the time we decided that instead, we would concentrate our efforts on providing information on where to go both to get and to offer assistance, and so ran a leaflet drop to every household.

Now, the event is back on the agenda, as April will see both increases in Council Tax and the likely reduction in some areas of support, and we want to make sure that everyone who is eligible knows what they can receive. The aim is to run this in conjunction with the other Wychwood parishes, to make it worth-while for the various organizations and charities to come out in force.

# Parking and Lines

White lines will be appearing in the village marking those areas where it is particularly dangerous and illegal to park. We are all aware of the issues raised by inconsiderate parking in the village, but also of the strong objections to having yellow lines painted. We hope this is a sensible and sensitive compromise and will work as a reminder to everyone, visitors included.

I have been asked by one of the residents to politely remind everyone that using telegraph poles for posters is not permitted.

# Litter Pick

It's that time of year again! For newer residents, Brian and Ingrid (Meadowbank House) organize a litter pick twice a year to deal with the unsightly rubbish that ends up strewn around our verges and in the streams. These are timed to coincide with the grass being relatively short and no snow or other covering. Many hands make light work so please get in contact if you can spare a couple of hours sometime during February.

# And Finally

We would like to thank Sue Richards for all her work on the Parish Council. Sue has now stepped down as she has left the village for pastures new, and we are looking to appoint her successor. If you believe that you can contribute to the life of our lovely village and can carve out some time to help your neighbours, please let any of us know and we will be happy to answer questions.

The first snowdrops are now poking out along the paths, and spring is around the corner.
